Castle Heritage Scholarship

Thanks to generosity of our alumni community, and in collaboration with University College Durham Trust (UCDT), we were able to introduce a two-year heritage scholarship at Castle. The scholarship is open to anyone wishing to study a postgraduate degree in Museum and Artefacts Studies at Durham University and covers the cost of tuition. It also gives students a unique opportunity to gain volunteer experience in Durham Castle Museum, providing valuable practical skills in the competitive heritage sector.

In 2017 we were delighted to welcome Laura Littlefair, who quickly became an integral member of our community and helped raise awareness of the precious fabric of the Castle. With the Trust's support, Laura's scholarship was extended by 2 years during the course of the pandemic and her role became a full-time Curatorial Assistant, helping her to gain valuable work experience, at a time when the graduate labour market was so uncertain.

Given the success of the initiative, the Trust agreed to continue the funding for the next Museum and Artefacts Studies Scholarship at Castle, which will provide a valuable opportunity for yet another postgraduate student and benefit the entire community into 2023 and beyond.

About my time...

I genuinely loved every moment of my time at Durham Castle, and I learnt so much – both personally and professionally – throughout my time here. In the early days of 2021, I spent a week cleaning dirt that had built up over the years, on the 400 year old stone floor of Screens Passage. Although this was a physically demanding job, it was perhaps the most satisfying I completed this year, and the difference the clean has made is phenomenal. University College Scholarships

We continue to be inspired by our alumni's generous support of current students through a range of scholarships and awards. Thanks to the generosity of two of our alumni we have been able to introduce two new scholarships of up to $\pounds4,000$ /per year for a duration of a student's undergraduate degree to study at Castle. These awards will enable young people who come from low income backgrounds to make the most of their time at Durham.

Scholarships and awards have a transformational impact – not only on the individual recipient, but also on our vibrant community more broadly, enabling students to make the most of the opportunities available and contribute to the College community. Thanks to our alumni's support we will be able to attract more students who would not ordinarily have the opportunity to come to Castle. Here their talents will be nurtured to their full potential.

Senior Common Room Hardship Support

University College runs termly hardship funding rounds for registered undergraduate and postgraduate members of the College. Typically capped at £300, or £500 in exceptional cases of

need, these are non-repayable grants drawn primarily from funds established by alumni donations and bequests. The College is extremely fortunate, and grateful, to be able to draw from three principal funds specifically endowed for hardship purposes, in addition to funding that is made available by the College. We have seen a marked increase in the number of applications for hardship awards and grants over the past couple of years, reflecting the rise in general living costs as well as decreased part-time work opportunities during the Covid-19 pandemic, particularly in Durham city.

We are both thrilled and humbled by the generosity of our Senior Common Room (SCR) members, who stepped in last year with a contribution to our hardship bursary fund. The donation provided funding for 30 additional students who experienced unexpected hardship as a result of the pandemic.

A Gift of Time

We also want to take a moment to recognise the difference that our volunteers make to the College through the gift of time and expertise. Whether through career advice to students, looking after our community as SCR Mentors or by sharing their wisdom on alumni leadership teams, these individuals truly embody our College motto, *Non nobis solum* (not for ourselves alone).

Jennifer Dell (Castle 2010-13) is a great example of a volunteer who has contributed to the College Community over a number of years. During her time at Castle, she held the integral role of Senior Student



(formerly referred to as the Senior Man) and she is still actively involved in providing opportunities for the people of Castle through her role on the University College Durham Trust.

"I've been part of the UCDT since September 2017. Whilst at Castle I had an active role in the JCR which brought me in contact with the alumni organisations on numerous occasions, so it felt like a return to familiar territory and something I knew I would enjoy. I gained so much from my time at the college, so being able to stay connected and contribute even in this small way was important to me. I especially wanted to bring a female voice to the table, and this led to my involvement in the Women of Castle project which was funded by the Trust. I'd love to use that platform as a jumping off point to connect more female alumni and current students in the future."
